### **Blueprint to Giving**

Joy and Mike Marchione, cat fanciers, always head to the PetSmart cat condos when shopping. During an adopt athon, Joy became acquainted with Julie Smith, SOS Animal Rescue foster caregiver. Joy was able to learn more about the foster adoption program. Aware of the huge need and importance of foster and adoption, she wanted to help. Since Joy and Mike themselves were not able to foster, raising funds would be the next best thing. Joy and Julie met for lunch to discuss how she might be able to accomplish that goal.



Upon retiring, Joy treated herself to a new super sewing machine with intentions of rekindling her love of quilt making and sewing. With that in mind, she made crate quilts for Julie's foster charges, which are always needed. Upon hearing how one of Julie's kittens had a pre-rescue injury that required therapeutic warmth for healing, Joy made arthritic rice bags that can be heated for the foster animals. However, this did not address the issue of raising funds. With Julie's blessing, Joy set out to have a rummage sale at her house for SOSAR where she could sell treasured items and also her sewn items. Her enthusiasm spilled onto a few of Joy's friends who contributed by donating fabric or making quilts. She also went as far as contacting her neighbors that were having rummage sales, asking for their excess unsold items to sell at her SOSAR sale. Friends and neighbors were eager to help. Joy thought that baked goods could be included. She again recruited the neighborhood to participate by baking some of their favorite homemade goodies.

Julie, Joy, and Mike spent hours preparing for the September 7-8 event. On sale day, Julie brought some of her adoptable cats and kittens. Four kittens, too young for adoption, were also brought along. They had to be with Julie 24-7, requiring bottle-feeding every few hours. These tiny kittens did not lack for kitten formula or loving surrogate mothers. Neighbors and friends took turns feeding and gently cuddling these little waifs to sleep.

The quilts, arthritic rice bags, and catnip mice made by Joy's 'Quilts for Cages' were not price fixed but left up to the individual the amount they wanted to donate for their selections. Some customers had a difficult time choosing because they were all so wonderfully made. Even though pricing was left up to the customer, all were generous donations.

The two-day sale was a huge success, raising over \$800 for the foster program. Julie also was able to find three cats-kittens their loving forever homes. SOS Animal Rescue members took the opportunity to educate shoppers about the SOSAR spay/neuter program for low-income Midland County residents and the foster program.

Joy and Mike Marchione, retired Dow Corning employees and long-time Midland residents, enjoy their spare time golfing and enjoying the nature that surrounds them in their beautiful garden in the middle of the city. They share their home with two lovely cat brothers, Max and Sam, both rescues. Joy continues to make her rice bags, catnip mice, and quilts.

The criteria for elected positions is listed in our bylaws:


- Section 1. Membership into SOSAR will be open to the public. Annual membership dues shall be determined by the board. Dues must be paid in order to be a member in good standing and eligible to vote.
- Section 2. All of the officers of the Board of Directors shall be members of SOSAR.
- Section 3. All directors and officers shall have been members of SOSAR for six months prior to their election. No person convicted of cruelty to animals or who engages or has engaged in blood sports involving animals may be a director.

## Positive Reinforcement Dog Training

Positive reinforcement dog training works by using praise and positive actions or rewards, rather than punishment or correctional actions, to teach your dog right from wrong. The key with this type of training is to determine what it is that motivates your dog and use that motivator as a reward upon correct performance. In positive reinforcement dog training, you can use treats, toys, physical affection, verbal praise, or a combination of these to reward your dog for correct behavior.

Here's how the method works: First you must determine a set of cue words, which will prompt your dog to perform specific actions. Some of the most basic and common cue words for dog training include:

- Sit
- Stay
- Off (when you want the dog to get off of the furniture or after having jumped on someone)
- Down (when you want the dog to lie down)
- Come
- Stand



- Don't lean over the dog and stick your hand in his face.
- Don't Lean over the dog and put your hand on top of his head.
- Don't grab or hug him.
- Don't stare him in the eye. (This is an adversarial posture.)
- Don't squeal or shout in his face.
- Don't grab his head and kiss it. (This is an invasion of space.)

Doing these things to a dog who doesn't know you is like a perfect stranger giving you a great big hug and kiss in an elevator.

### THE CORRECT WAY TO GREET A DOG:

- No eve contact.
- Let the dog approach you in his own time.
- Keep either your side or back towards the dog (non-threatening posture).
- Pet or stroke him on the SIDE of his face or body.

In positive reinforcement dog training, it is important to reward the dog immediately upon responding correctly to the cue. For example, if you cue your dog to sit and he does so, you need to immediately let him know that he did a good thing by telling him "yes", or "good". Then you proceed by promptly giving him the reward. Remember, the reward must be something that your dog gets some pleasure from. If your dog loves food, then reward him with a small treat. If he really likes to play with a certain toy, then reward him by throwing the toy so that he can fetch it. If perhaps he is most motivated by physical affection, then you can reward him with a belly rub or a nice ear scratch. Do not however wait too long to reward him for the action, otherwise it may end up just confusing him. For example, if you asked your dog to sit and then waited until he stood back up again before rewarding him, then he will associate the sit command with the action of standing up. After all, that is what you rewarded him for.

During the time in which you are training your dog to respond to new cues, you will want to reward him every time the correct action is performed. However, once he has successfully mastered the cue and is performing consistently without hesitation it will no longer be necessary to provide rewards each time he performs the specific action. Simply reinforce to him verbally that he was correct by telling him "yes", or "good".

The two key issues with positive reinforcement dog training are consistency and timing. Be consistent in your training methods, ensuring that you use the same cue words each and every time and, make sure that your timing in terms of rewarding correct behavior is bang on. Above all, this should be fun for both you and your dog. If either of you are not having fun, you're doing something wrong. Accept the fact that training your dog will take time and patience but eventually your consistency and persistence will pay off.

### When You Have a Lapsed User of the Cat Litterbox

One in every 10 cats will have a litterbox lapse in his or her lifetime. The 20 most common reasons are:

- 1. The cat is suffering from a medical problem involving the urinary tract.
- 2. The cat experiences a bout of geriatric constipation.
- 3. The caretaker does not keep the box as clean as the cat wants it to be.
- 4. The owner changes the brand or type of litter.
- 5. The owner changes the location of the litterbox.
- 6. The owner switches to deodorized or perfumed litter.
- 7. The owner buys a new box and throws out the old one.
- 8. The owner cleans the litterbox with too harsh a cleaning product.
- 9. The location of the litterbox is too busy or not private enough for the cat.
- 10. The home is too large for just one litterbox.
- 11. The cat inadvertently gets locked out of reach of the litterbox.
- 12. The cat is kept from using the litterbox by another animal in the house.
- 13. There are too many cats and not enough litterboxes.
- 14. There are too many cats and not enough territory.
- 15. Stray cats can be seen/smelled near the cat's territory.
- 16. The unneutered male cat has come of age and is marking his territory.
- 17. The unspayed female is in heat and advertising for suitors.
- 18. Over time, the cat has developed an aversion to the texture of the litter.
- 19. The cat was never properly trained to use the litterbox in the first place.
- 20. The cat is stressed by a change in routine or environment, including a new baby, new furniture, work schedule changes, vacations, overnight guests, or a move.

Did You Know?

Many scoopable cat litters are processed in such a way to remove as much of the fine dust as possible. If you find that you or your cat is particularly sensitive to airborne dust particles, you may wish to consider using an alternate form of litter.

"A Brand New Season" food distribution event was held at the Loon's Stadium on Saturday, September 22. The response was excellent with over 975 families participating. Food donations were given along with 40 different local agencies available with information. Isabella Jansen and I represented SOS Animal Rescue and used this opportunity as an educational event. Along with helping others, Isabella and I felt blessed ourselves that we could assist those in need. It certainly was an experience I shall not forget.
