




Bottle Babies – Lost mom and needed feedings every two hours from foster mom.


Percy - Fleas and upper respiratory illness.

"The Rescuers Final Reward" by Benny Archuleta

Unlike most days at the Rainbow Bridge, this day dawned cold and gray. All the recent arrivals at the Bridge did not know what to think, as they had never seen such a day. But the animals who had been waiting longer for their beloved people to accompany them across the Bridge knew what was happening, and they began to gather at the pathway leading to the Bridge.

Soon an elderly dog came into view, head hung low and tail dragging. He approached slowly, and though he showed no sign of injury or illness, he was in great emotional pain. Bentlee was still a fragile cat with a bent neck.

A previous adopter with a super big heart, Sharon Brady looked past Bentlee's challenges and welcomed her into the family. As Sharon told of us Bentlee's recent passing, she outlined the journey they made together. Bentlee was eventually diagnosed with a ruptured disc in her spine which led to total paralysis twice. Bentlee also experienced



other health issues yet was able to enjoy life and provide Sharon with love, affection, as well as antics with yarn balls, chipmunks, and doorbells.

We are forever grateful to Sharon who provided a home for Bentlee and all the other adopters who have taken in sick, injured, and challenged pets.

How to Keep Kitty out of the Christmas Tree

Christmas is here and your cat's eyes are sure to light up if you bring home a Christmas tree strung with sparkly new toys – oops, sorry Christmas decorations. Kitties cannot always differentiate between dangly things that they are allowed to play with and dangly things that are strictly for decorative purposes. And who can blame them? Felines are notoriously curious animals.

And yet, no-one wants to spend hours arranging the Christmas tree decorations only to have your cat leap onto it and knock everything over. More seriously, tinsel and fake snow can be very harmful to cats if ingested. So what do you do? Here are some handy hints on the topic of how to keep kitty out of the Christmas tree.

Cat-Proof Your Tree with Tinfoil

Not many people know this, but most cats simply hate the feeling of tinfoil on their paws and claws. So one smart thing that you can do to keep kitty out of that tree is to wrap the trunk with tinfoil. If you get some festive silver, green, or red tinfoil you can create an aesthetically pleasing effect whilst simultaneously keeping your tree free of those adventurous cats.

Pay Attention to the Base of Your Tree

A sturdy base which is hard to tip over is a must when you are placing a Christmas tree in a house shared by both humans and felines. If you place your tree in a high, smooth bucket, your cats will probably not consider it worth the effort to attempt to climb up it. Adding a so-called "tree skirt" to tuck all electrical wires out of sight (if you are decorating your tree with colored lights) is also a good idea as electrical wires and prying paws are never a good mix.

Experiment with Cat-Repelling Sprays

Here's the good news: many of the scents which cats can't stand actually smell deliciously festive to humans. Citrus is one example; if you spray your tree (whether real or artificial) with a mist of citrus spray, your cat will not want to get too close to it. You can purchase sprays like this from pet and grocery stores or you can make your own with a little lemon or orange essential oil mixed with water. Another good product to investigate is known as bitter apple. It doesn't really register to the human nose, but cats hate it.

If you don't want to spray products directly onto the tree, another thing you can do is to get some fabric impregnated with citrus or bitter apple odor and use it to wrap the trunk. Like the tinfoil suggested above, this both looks attractive and festive and has a practical cat-proofing purpose.



Place Decorations out of Reach

You can have all the sparkly decorations that you want near the top of the tree. Zillions of little wooden stars hanging just within reach of your cat's paws are simply asking for trouble! As we all know, cats cannot resist the temptation to bat, bite and yank anything that looks fun and is within reach.

Mount It on the Ceiling

Or you could go all out and mount it on the ceiling.

Most importantly, have a safe and Merry Christmas!
