Everything You Need to Know About Kitten Season

Did you know spring kicks off a phenomenon known as kitten season? That's right, there is a season just for kittens and it is upon us! Depending on how you feel about cats, kitten season can sound like the best season of the year. Sounds like cuteness in abundance, round kitten bellies and playtime all day long! Unfortunately, kitten season isn't quite that, especially for the kittens and the people who opt to take care of them. (Though there is a lot of cuteness.) Here are the answers to some frequently asked questions about kitten season:

What Is Kitten Season?

What is kitten season, you ask? As winter draws to a close and the weather begins to warm, many unaltered female cats are in heat. Sixty days later they begin giving birth to litters of kittens. Many shelters become overwhelmed with unwanted kittens from March through October, so if you're contemplating adopting or fostering a kitten, look no further than your local animal shelter. Kitten season occurs usually twice a year, and in colder areas, once a year. California is unique in that they have kitten season on average twice a year because of the warmer weather. It is possible that cats can have kittens in other times of the year as well.

Why Is There a Kitten Season?

Kitten season is usually in line with when cats go into heat. November, December and January are colder months and cats usually go into heat when the weather gets nicer.

What Does Being 'in Heat' Mean?

When a cat is in heat, the cat is ready to meet a mate and conceive kittens. There are only certain periods of the year when cats are in heat and that is in line with the weather, as described above.

What is a Litter?

A litter is a number of kittens that a female cat can have through a pregnancy. On average, a cat can have anywhere from four to eight kittens. Because a cat can have on average four to eight kittens during on pregnancy, and a cat can be pregnant several times a year, the cat population gets bigger at a faster rate than the dog population. This is a reason why spaying or neutering your cat is so important.

How Many Litters Can a Cat Have?

A cat can have more than one litter through one pregnancy. During the average seven-day period when cats are in heat, cats can have encounters with multiple male cats and be impregnated by multiple male cats and have the multiple cats' litters all at one time – meaning they can give birth to cats with different fathers at once!

Five Quick Kitten Facts

- Felines are considered kittens until they are one year in age.
- All kittens are born with blue eyes with their permanent eye color appearing around four weeks of age.
- An unaltered female cat can become pregnant at four months of age so spay your kitten!
- A kitten can be spayed or neutered when they reach two pounds in body weight, typically at eight weeks of age.
- Kittens instinctively know to use a litter box.

How Can I Help?

Shelters and cat rescues almost always need donations and foster parents during kitten season. Adopting or fostering a kitten will provide you with hours of fun and entertainment. Of course, a kitten's favorite toy is another kitten, so you may want to consider adopting a second cat. Two kittens growing up together will be well socialized, and interested in exploring new things. See if organizations in your area need supplies like litter, food, blankets and toys.

Sunscreen and Zinc Oxide Ingestion in Pets

Sunscreen is one of those items the ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center gets regular calls about in the summer.

If you've read the back of a container of sunscreen, you know it can contain many ingredients. Generally, the primary reported issue for a pet who has ingested sunscreen is gastrointestinal upset; occasionally, those signs may be severe and include diarrhea, bloody vomiting, and potentially dehydration.

Sunscreen generally contains two primary ingredients you should know about: salicylates and zinc oxide.

Salicylates

Many sunscreens contain salicylates, often more than one kind, at various concentrations. Salicylates have several effects in the body that may result in respiratory alkalosis and compensatory metabolic acidosis. On rare occasions, pets may experience hepatoxicity, hyperthermia, and seizures. Gastric ulcerations are also possible with exposure to salicylates. While these more serious effects are not commonly reported when sunscreens are ingested, more caution may be warranted when large amounts or higher concentrations of salicylates are ingested.

Zinc Oxide

Besides sunscreen, zinc oxide is also commonly found in diaper rash creams. The most common sign reported is vomiting—and because it often occurs soon after exposure due to the irritating nature of zinc oxide, pets may decontaminate themselves this way.

On rare occasions, allergic reactions are reported with ingestion of zinc oxide—typically manifesting in facial swelling and pruritis. Luckily zinc oxide is not absorbed well from the gastrointestinal tract, so zinc toxicity is not common with ingestions of diaper creams and sunscreens.

The Packaging

Sometimes the biggest concern regarding sunscreen exposure is not the active ingredients but the actual tube itself. Foreign body obstruction is a concern if a pet ingests a large portion of the tube.

5 Hot Tips for Summer Pet Care

Summertime is fun time, but hot weather makes for some unique summer pet care challenges. Pets can be just as susceptible to extreme temperatures as their owners are. When the temperatures get extreme, pet safety should be top of mind. Here are five ways to stay safe while enjoying summer activities with your pet:

Respect the heat. Your pet has a limited ability to deal with the heat. Make certain that pets have access to plenty of fresh, cool water. Avoid letting them run around outside during the hottest parts of the day.

Keep bugs away—safely. Fertilizers and pesticides can be very dangerous for your pet. And watch for fertilizer warnings on neighbors' lawns when walking your dog. Cut grass short to reduce the presence of ticks.

Beware of antifreeze. In the summertime, it can leak out of cars when they overheat, leaving puddles on the ground that your dog can easily lap up. The sweet taste of antifreeze is tempting to dogs and cats, but when it's ingested, it's potentially lethal.

Find out if your pet needs sunscreen. Some pets are susceptible to sunburn. Talk to your veterinarian about

sunscreens that are safest on your pet's skin. (Read article at left for sunscreen safety.)

Practice water safety. Keep a close eye on your pet when they are in or near the water. For riskier summer adventures with your dog, like boating, look into a doggie life preserver.

Watch over your pet the way you would a small child—protect them from too much heat, sun, and other summer dangers—and everything should be just fine.
